'Sorry seems to be the hardest word...'

Apologies – or lack of them – never seem to drift too far from the top of the media agenda. All too often, in the words of Elton John's song, "sorry seems to be the hardest word." Yet to re-establish broken relationships 'sorry' is one of the words that needs to be said first, but it often seems the hardest. If we cause hurt to others, either unintentionally or deliberately, we should feel deep regret for our actions and take responsibility for them. However, instead we can resort to justifying our actions or blaming someone else rather than admit our wrong. This is nothing new – it has been happening since the Garden of Eden. Defensive self-justification. Passing the buck. A total unwillingness to admit we're in the wrong. But if we want to change, we must first admit our 'wrong' and feel deep sorrow over it.

When it comes to the Bible's understanding, saying sorry is part of what it means by the word repentance. To 'repent' means, basically, to turn around. It begins in the mind and leads to a change of action. Just saying the word is not enough. Doing the action is what really counts. In his letter to the Christians in Corinth St. Paul talks about the big difference between godly sorrow and worldly sorrow. Worldly sorrow is saying sorry but not meaning it and, therefore, being left with bitterness and regret, remaining 'cut off' from others and God. Whereas with genuine godly sorrow there is forgiveness and power to change. How can that be? Well, the events of Easter provide us with a big clue! Whether we choose to admit it or not, we all do wrong, which puts us on the wrong side of God. However, God has done something about it. He came from heaven to earth, in the person of Jesus Christ, in order to get us from earth to heaven. In taking our wrongs upon Himself, on the cross, we can find forgiveness, be freed of the wrong things we have done, and start with a 'clean slate'. We can look back and say, "yes I know I did wrong and am sorry, but I am forgiven".

I made this amazing discovery several years ago and my life has never been the same since. Yet, admitting my need of forgiveness and accepting that I was forgiven wasn't easy, mainly due to pride and guilt. It's one thing to admit you're in the wrong, quite another to accept forgiveness and have the power to change.

Do you bear burdens of regret and bitterness which weigh you down? Maybe you've been deeply wronged or have deeply hurt someone else. Well, as we continue through this Easter season let us not forget that the message of triumph life over death, light over darkness, love over hatred, peace over anxiety and joy over grief remains unchanged. Saying 'sorry' is not a sign of weakness but of strength, which liberates rather than imprisons – especially when said to God who, in His love, accepts us as we are, but because He loves us, doesn't leave us as we are.

Parish Council News

Save the date! Thursday 25th April is the date of the Annual Village Meeting. It's at the village hall and doors open at 7pm for half an hour or so of browsing the table top exhibits by village organisations before the meeting starts at 7.30pm. As usual refreshments will be served.



There will be updates about all areas that the Parish Council is involved with during the meeting, as well as the opportunity to hear reports from our local councillors. One of the topics raised this year will be the future of the village hall. Since last year there has been a significant increase in the usage of the village hall on a regular basis and the finances have been put on a sustainable basis. Several dozen people have signed up to the formation of a support group. A name such as Friends of the Village Hall comes to mind. The village meeting is an opportunity to discuss plans for the future development of the premises some of which have happened (the kitchen has had a makeover) and others are in the planning stage (the car park is one).

Anyone who likes to think of themselves as a friend of the Village Hall will want to come to another meeting a couple of weeks before the Village Meeting. It's the Annual General Meeting of the charity that is responsible for the management of the hall and, unlike the other meetings of the trustee body, the AGM has to be held in public. In order to attract the widest possible participation the meeting will be on the same Saturday as the W.I. Library and Cafe, 13th April. The AGM will be at 12 noon when the Library and Cafe closes. For those who want to stay on after the AGM there will be soup and rolls. It will be the first time that friends and trustees have got together to develop a common purpose. On the one hand trustees have to manage the premises keeping it safe, compliant and well maintained. On the other hand friends want to have some say in the direction of travel. You can have your say too if you come to the meetings!

Murmurations

April. A sense of springtime is evolving, the mud is finally evaporating. I wake in the mornings to the comforting coo of wood pigeons and the twanging ruler noise of woodpeckers drumming – their method of communication, not only to forge territories but also to attract a mate. I hear several woodpeckers over in the woodland, simultaneously hammering trees of different sizes, creating a mesmerising, xylophonic composition. All this feathered flirtation makes for hungry work and so, with their regenerative beak-ends, the woodpeckers tap tap and listen for the sound of insects in the bark, then drilling into the tree or reaching into a crevice with their extra-long tongues they probe for insects and larvae. They are also, as we know, using their beaks to excavate their nesting holes. I'm now wondering what a collection of woodpeckers is called. A vibrato? A peckery? A drummery? I check... it's a descension of woodpeckers, and it reminds me - we have a little toy, a woodpecker that judders down a metal pole. Most of these birds have zygodactyl feet that are highly adapted for climbing: two toes in the front and two at the back allow the woodpeckers to grip the tree, to move up and down at high speed and to have good leverage for pecking.

April, and there are blossoms, blossoms everywhere... apple, cherry, hawthorn, damson. Little clusters of ballet-slipper pinks and sprays of dove and milky whites. And there's a certain shade of white – I call it 'pudding white', that I can taste when I see it – sweet, white and gloopy: my favourite school dessert! I'm back in the hubbub of the school canteen now (1983), finding a place to sit. But I trip, flip my tray over and catapult the bowl of sweet, snowy slop against the window where it sticks and slides, down, down, down to the floor...

April 1st, 1984 - Sunday. Bath and bed. But What?! The sheet stops halfway down, I can only get in up to my hips! And there are 'things', random things inside... hairbrush, plimsoll, yoyo, marmite, colour pencils, Rubik's Cube, frisbee, cassettes, action man, slinky, kaleidoscope, marbles, and a yellow plasticine snake! (Apple-Pye Bed – or 'short sheeting' is first referred to in a 1781 diary entry by James Woodforde, diarist and clergyman; it was my little brother who added 'things' and a new version of apple pie was born.) Some things we just can't plan for; if you're reading this as we approach April Fool's Day, don't lose sleep worrying about jests and jokes because, "What we anticipate seldom occurs, but what we least expect generally happens." (Benjamin Disraeli). To be more concise - according to a 2005 Study: 85% of what we worry about never happens...

Fruit Crumble Cake

This delicious dessert/cake always proves popular and is easy to make. Recipe from the Penhurst Cookery Book.

Makes 16 portions Preheat oven to 180°c, 350°f or gas mark 4

For the cake

300g butter - softened
300g caster sugar
6 large eggs
250g self raising flour

250g Sell raising nour

100g almonds

2tsp ground cinnamon1tsp baking powder

For the crumble

500g fruit - eg apples, mixed summer fruits, 100g plain flour 3 tbsp demerara sugar 25g flaked almonds

Grease and line a 20cm x 30cm tray bake

Put all of the cake ingredients into a large bowl, beat with an electric hand whisk until combined

Set aside 100g of the batter and spread the rest evenly into the tin

Spread the fruit in a layer evenly over the batter

Roughly mix the plain flour into the reserved batter until lumpy crumbs are formed

Stir in the sugar and flaked almonds and scatter over the fruit

Bake for 1 hour or until a skewer inserted comes out clean

Cut into squares, serve immediately as a dessert with cream or custard or allow to cool and use a cake, store in an airtight tin.

Gardening and Nature Notes

I am sure that I am not alone in finding this winter one of the wettest I can remember. According to government statistics, February was the fourth wettest on record since 1871! I know many gardeners and farmers who are really struggling with the wet conditions which combined with the mild weather also means everything is growing - including weeds and grass. It's frustrating for all of us but particularly challenging for those making a living from the land. We are used to constantly adapting to different conditions but the relentless nature of this winter's wet weather has really challenged people professionally and personally.

As we come into spring, we can only hope that the weather improves and that we get some more dry days so that we can not only get on with tasks outside but also enjoy walks in the woodland and fields around us as the anemones, bluebells and wild garlic carpet the ground with such beauty. It's lovely to hear the birds singing at dawn, dusk and all the hours in between again now that spring is here. Chiff Chaffs are back and singing out in the woods and the Yellow Hammers along the track near me are chanting their 'a little bit of bread and no cheese' refrain regularly. They are a red-listed bird meaning their population is in decline, they nest in shrubby hedges along field margins - just the habitat they enjoy here.

In the garden the amount of work that can be done depends a lot on the soil condition, the wet weather has left our heavy clay unworkable in some areas. In the Ornamental Gardens at Ashburnham Place the beds have been worked and mulched over so many generations that they are better drained and workable in many places. The Camellias have been putting on a fantastic early show this year, untroubled by frost and the Azaleas and Rhododendrons are coming out now too. At home, our pond plants are beginning to re-emerge the beautiful, deep yellow flowers of Marsh Marigold providing a particularly spectacular show and brightening up a dull day. It's a great plant for wildlife ponds as it provides shelter for frogs and toads and early nectar for pollinating insects. I have a new area for growing veg this year after some rearrangement at home and I'm looking forward to getting my usual beans, courgettes, squash and lettuce seeds growing soon. I love to grow Sweet Peas too and we sowed those at work in February and the seedlings are coming up strongly. They are such a great plant to grow, they look pretty, smell divine and you have to keep picking them in order to keep them flowering so you always have something for a vase indoors!
