

Jesus is the Reason For the Season!

December marks an important anniversary in the history of aviation! It was in December 1903, after many attempts, that the Wright brothers were successful in getting their 'flying machine' off the ground! Thrilled by their achievement they telegraphed a message to their sister, Katherine, which read: "We have actually flown 120 feet. Will be home for Christmas". Katherine, excited by her brothers' achievement, hurried to the editor of the local newspaper. He glanced at the telegram and said, "How nice. The boys will be home for Christmas'. He had totally missed the point, the BIG news - that man had actually flown.

Often, we can make the same mistake when we hear the word CHRISTMAS. We don't think of Jesus and His miraculous birth. Instead, we think of hectic shopping sprees, parties at school and at work, family gatherings, festive meals, decorations and gifts! For many, Christmas brings nostalgia and memories of childhood! Now all this celebration isn't wrong, but if that's all Christmas means to us, we are missing its true significance - summed up in the words of the angel to the shepherds on that night long ago, "I bring you good tidings of great joy which will be to you and to all people. For there is born to you this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord". That's the BIG news of Christmas!

During the next few weeks, whether carolling around the village or in The Ash, or at our church services, we will be recalling the momentous events of Jesus' birth. What a contrast between the circumstances surrounding the royal child born long ago in a Bethlehem stable, to what we would expect of a royal birth today. Jesus' parents had no plush accommodation booked at the Jerusalem Hilton or a lavish maternity suite. No crowds of reporters competed to be the first to break the news that the Son of God had been born, and Israel had prepared no national festivities in His honour. When God's Son came, He was born into a lowly peasant family, amidst the stench of a dirty stable, in a tiny remote corner of the Roman empire! Even so, He was indeed a Royal child, who has been known and is known by millions around the world as both Lord and Saviour! In Saint Luke's account of Jesus' birth, we read: "and Mary gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped Him in clothes and placed Him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn". Might we find room for Jesus this Christmas?

As I write this article the conflict in Israel and Gaza, still rages. The intricate tapestry of this longstanding conflict is very complex and, it seems to me, that the message of the angels needs to be heard, received, and embraced now more than ever. 2700 or so years ago the nation of Israel was in a dark place – life was tough, and the future was bleak: many people were overtaken by despair and uncertainty. Yet, amid such darkness God's message of hope rang out, as recorded in the following Bible passage, often read at this time of year: 'The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned. For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace'. These words of Isaiah, who was a prophet, speak of the coming of Christ, the Light that was to shine in a world in need of help, hope, and comfort. Why not visit your local church this Christmas and join us as we celebrate His coming; it would be lovely to see you. In the meantime, may I wish you God's richest blessing this Christmas and throughout the coming year. God bless, Revd Gary

Parish Council News

The only clue the players are given at the start of the Twenty Questions parlour game is to be told that the 'something' they have to guess is either animal, vegetable, mineral or abstract. The abstract ones are always tricky. What is the parish council or the parochial church council or a board of trustees? All of these are, strictly speaking, abstract, but they are very real in another sense as they are legal entities meaning that they are able to enter into legal contracts.



Sometimes it's not obvious how you would title the people who meet together to conduct the business of the entity. The easy ones are councils who have councillors. Trustees, however, are not always so simple. Often there is a Deed of Trust and the members are listed individually as trustees. If the Trust is a registered charity you can look up the trustees on the Charity Commission website.

Ashburnham and Penhurst Village Hall is a registered charity (No.305160) but, since November 2022, if you look it up on the Charity Commission website you will see only one trustee, "Parish Council of Ashburnham with Penhurst". The Parish Council is still settling into its new role as Sole Managing Trustee which it must keep separate and at arms length from the Parish Council. Councillors met in November in this new role for the second time. They have the advantage over the former trustees (the Village Hall Management Committee) in that in their other role as Parish Councillors they have legal powers regarding the provision and support for village halls. It provides an opportunity to provide the village hall with a little more certainty over its financial future which has looked increasingly unsustainable over the past ten years.

Council meetings are on the fourth Wednesday of alternate months and the next one will be on Wednesday 24th January 2024. Tthe Planning Committee (if required) meets on the fourth Wednesday of intervening months. A list of councillors' lead responsibilities can be seen on the village website at www.ashburnham-penhurst.net

All meetings are in public and members of the public are encouraged to attend. There is an agenda slot near the start of the meeting for members of the public to address the Council. The agenda is published online at the village website three clear days before the meeting and hard copy is posted on the notice board at The Chapel. Minutes of meetings are published on the village website.

Murmurations

Time is precious. One blink and it's that time again - to don our woollies, pop on our wellies and clamber aboard one of the festive tractor and trailers to (sweetly) belt-out carols around the village; the exchange for serenading our hosts being warmed, spicey wine and assorted treats. Last year we were blessed to have a clear, starry sky and several inches of snow, (the snowiest Christmas I can remember). We were likely mistaken for The Vicar of Dibley cast on location as, in the moonlight, we filed down the ramps of the sheep trailers and skidded and scooched into various gardens. We could see where we were heading but mostly drifted off course, all the while humming Paul Simon's hit: "You know the nearer your destination, the more you're slip slidin' away..."

With a selection of carol evenings under my expanding belt I was satisfied by Boxing Day that my year had been well-wrapped up; memories spread around me like the best bargains had in the last hour of the Ninfield jumble sale. If we have time to stand still we might ask, what is time? How is it that days, weeks or even months pass by while we are seemingly in auto-pilot, and how does time seemingly speed up with age? Based on the simple physical and biological principles of neural signal processing, the rate at which we process visual information slows down over time, and this can maybe explain why time 'speeds up' as we grow older. As we age, the size and complexity of the networks of neurons in our brains increases and so electrical signals must travel greater distances and signal processing takes more time. In addition, ageing causes our nerves to be more resistant to the flow of electric signals, even further slowing processing time; all in all this results in us perceiving fewer 'frames-per-second' and so more actual time passes between the perception of each new mental image. Some years ago, acutely aware of this 'life's speeding up' feeling, and busy in a cycle of early mornings and late work evenings, I began to carve out new experiences within my daily routine: now, whenever I food shop I bring home something entirely new (sometimes entirely odd) to cook and eat; when driving along a familiar road, I take a random turn to explore a road or lane never taken. I love these routes - one of them is called The Smallest Road in the World, in our family anyway - and kids and husband invariably duck, cover their eyes and adopt a brace position when I veer left onto it. My gift: an almost off-road experience (on account of the permanent pot holes); their gift to me: cultivating the art of appreciation! At this, and every time of the year, we can offer the gift of time. More presence than presents means more than anything. Time is precious.

Garden and Nature Notes

As we hunker down and spend more time indoors with shorter days and uninviting weather I thought it might be a good opportunity to mention a few books that I have enjoyed reading over the last year.

Some books are laid out in seasons or months and these can be wonderful to dip into to remind us what we can be looking out for in the natural world at particular times and inspire us to get outside. One that I love is 'The Wild Remedy' by Emma Mitchell, subtitled 'How Nature Mends Us - A Diary'. She writes beautifully about nature and honestly about her mental health struggles and the ways in which nature helps her.

Another collection of seasonal writings I have been introduced to this year is 'Next to Nature' by Ronald Blythe. He spent fifty years living in a remote farmhouse and recording his observations of the changing seasons around him as well as reflection on the rhythm of church and rural life.

Last Christmas I was given 'The Creative Gardener' by Adam Frost which is full of great ideas for projects large and small in the garden. Everything from making a brick edged fire pit to planting combinations for seasonal containers. It's written in the practical and friendly style anyone who watches Adam on Gardener's World will be familiar with and is packed with inspiring photos.

A great book for history lovers is "The Story of the English Garden' by Ambra Edwards. A beautifully illustrated and readable guide to the development of gardens through history. It's a must-read for anyone who enjoys visiting historic gardens as it will help you understand the different design aspects what they tell you about the history of gardens and landscapes.

One book I am looking forward to reading is 'An Almost Impossible Thing' by Fiona Davision. The author follows the lives and careers of six women gardeners in the years before the First World War. The title comes from a reply from a retired director of Kew Gardens in 1906 to a woman enquiring about careers for women in horticulture, he wrote 'Gardening taken up as a hobby when all the laborious work can be done by a man is delightful, but as a life's work (for a woman) it is an almost impossible thing'. I know myself and several female readers of this magazine who make their living in horticulture would respectfully disagree!
