'We Pray'

While driving along Kitchenham Road, listening to Sara Cox on Radio 2, my ears pricked up listening to a song called 'We Pray'. It turned out to be by Coldplay, in collaboration with Little Simz, Burna Boy, Elyanna, and TINI. The catchy melody, along with the unexpected spiritual theme, caused me to do some on-line 'research'!

It would seem, that Coldplay have never shied away from the underlying search for meaning and purpose. Indeed, some describe Coldplay's last album as their most religious, with psalm-like lyrics such as 'Holy, holy, God defend; shield me, show me; when I need a friend' (When I need a Friend) and 'Oh the Lord will shine a light' (BrokEn). And now, have these global superstars given us, with 'We Pray,' their most overtly spiritual single yet? If so, what might that tell us about our current culture?

Having debuted the song at Glastonbury in June, Chris Martin (lead singer) captures some of the desperate realities of life for which to pray. Borrowing straight from the Bible, these describe our fallen 2024 life in 'the valley of the shadow of death'. Dare I say, in my view, Coldplay are to be commended for their willingness to publicly lament for all that is broken in our world - something the Church has not always done so well.

The evidence of this, in the repeated response of the chorus, is unavoidable:

"And so we pray for some one to come and show me the way;
And so we pray for some shelter and some records to play;
And so we pray we'll be singing "Baraye"
Pray that we make it to the end of the day;
And so we pray I know somewhere that Heaven is waitin'
And so we pray I know somewhere there's something amazin'
And so we pray I know somewhere we'll feel no pain
Until we make it to the end of the day."

Is this not some spiritual yearning for what Christians would call 'Redemption' and 'Restoration'? For all their emphasis on loving one another as fellow human beings, Martin & friends don't seem to simply be wishing, hoping, longing for a humanist solution. 'And so we pray...' articulates something more substantial. It cries out to the heavens for 'someone to come and show me the way', before then resting in the hope that 'I know somewhere that Heaven is waiting... I know somewhere there's something amazing... I know somewhere we'll feel no pain.' In a world often caught up in self-defining individualism is this not an appeal for a bigger and better story?

Reflecting on this amazing song, I am left with a question: 'And so we pray...' to whom? For Christians, it's a loving Father in heaven - infinitely personal and approachable through Jesus. While the term "Father" can be misunderstood, especially in a world where fatherhood is often flawed, the Christian belief transcends these imperfections, offering a relationship where prayer becomes more than just ritual; it's a conversation with the Creator, a source of comfort, and a pathway to peace. Thus, it would seem 'We Pray', with its hint at an unmerited relationship ('Keep a smilin' face only by His grace'), is a call to something deeper -an invitation to connect with a divine presence that is not only near but profoundly personal.

This longing to 'connect' finds its most radical answer in the Christian gospel and is certainly not abstract or generic. The Word made flesh (Jesus Christ) steps into our broken world, offering not just individual comfort but lasting transformation. In a world teetering on the edge, perhaps what we truly need is not just to pray, but to recognise the One who hears.

CELEBRATING FAITH - CHICHESTER 950

2025 marks the 950th anniversary of the formation of the Diocese of Chichester and Chichester Cathedral and 1700 years since the Nicene Creed first emerged. In 1075 the decision was made to



move the seat of the Bishop from Selsey to the more populous town of Chichester, the former Roman settlement known as Noviomagus. The original Cathedral and Bishop's Palace were rebuilt on the present site in the early 13th century after a disastrous fire. The Diocese retains its original boundaries, serving the people of East and West Sussex and Brighton and Hove. 2025 also marks the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea which resulted in the Nicene Creed emerging a document still recited by Christians summarising the essence of what they believe.

A wide range of events celebrating both anniversaries are in the process of being organised the Diocese, including in Ashburnham and Penhurst. The Bishop of Chichester, Dr Martin Warner, writes: 'This momentous celebration reminds us that we cannot define God. Faith is an exploration in which we risk everything to glimpse the mystery of God's glory and to discover our place in His heart of love. All of these will serve to inspire and strengthen our faith as we seek together to know, love, and follow the Lord Jesus in 2025 and beyond. We look forward to sharing more details of Celebrating Faith and Chichester 950 with you in due course.".

Parish Council News

An ongoing challenge for the Parish Council after it became sole managing trustee of the village hall charity in November 2022 is how to ensure that the voices of users are heard and that the views and contributions of those who want to actively support the hall have a channel they can use. When the Rev John Bickersteth gave the old village school to the parish for use as a village hall in 1962 he set up the charity and its governing document which listed the organisations to be represented as trustees and members of the management



committee. These were the Women's Institute, the British Legion, Ashburnham Congregational Church, the Parochial Church Council, the Youth Organisation and the the Parish Council. Over many years the composition changed to reflect changes in the village and the numbers swelled reaching a dozen or more as recently as 2015. Since then numbers have dwindled and by 2022 the committee was back to just five organisations but attendance was only about 50%. The Parish Council has yet to crack the problem, but in the meantime the trustees have been welcoming to their meetings people who have expressed an interest in the future of the village hall and in taking forward ideas for improvements. The trustee body meets next in October and again with visitors.

Murmurations

It's late summer. I'm sitting on the sunny side of the train, on my hands. Trying not to do anything, not to be busy. I drink in the passing landscape of the High Weald, its characteristic patchwork of small fields and wooded hills. Over the hedge a large waterhole; a pair of moorhens mooch in the middle and ripples creep out towards the perimeter, poached where cattle have stood shoulder to shoulder to drink. Behind, meadows of sun-bleached grasses either move in the breeze or are already baled, awaiting collection. And between the carriage and the meadows, the boundary-line of hazels are dotted with nuts, and rowan trees are aflame with orange berries. Next, we're rolling through a small forest, and I spot sun-speckled fallow deer flicking their tails at the morning midges. Then on along damp, ferny hollows, flanked by young birch, their yellowing leaves scattered like counters thrown into the sky.

The train is still quite empty, peaceful, as we pass through Wadhurst and, in the rich seam between railroad and agriculture, I catch the last flourishes of ragwort (favoured by the striking cinnabar moth caterpillars) and the tall, pink spires of the rosebay willowherb.

We pause at Tunbridge Wells while animated day trippers board, their children asking 101 questions, then their eyes are like saucers as we enter a tunnel... "It's sooo dark!" (And I think back to my childhood - wasn't the entire train plunged into tunnel-gloom then?) Popping out into the light again we're cheered on by bindweed bunting with its white, trumpeting flowers strung along the bramble bushes, these jewelled with blackberries - green and red - but some ready in bold, bonne- bouche black. Further on, amongst some expanding urban sprawl, reddening apples are peeping over garden fences - some have escaped into The Wildlands - and previously compliant plants have also clambered over, free of their suburban restrictions. Tonbridge next, over the river Medway and soon, a cluster of five Kentish oasts dominate a modest farming settlement, and nearby, a herd of horses stand under a billowing oak as the sun continues to climb overhead. Beyond Sevenoaks the savannah-like plains spread wide and far to the North Downs, where wind-bent hawthorn and burnished bracken thrive on sheepsculpted slopes.

Now we're within the environs of London where the brown-field sidings are wild with nettles, nodding with dangly seeds, and spears of purple (butterfly bush) buddleia. Across the city-scape naturalised apartment block roofs soften the greyness, the steel and the gawky cranes. I look away – open the summer What's On magazine left on the seat beside me. I've missed most of it probably – it's autumn now. But the very first plug outlines the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition 'displaying over 1,700 works of art'. Life's funny; it's just where I'm heading... with a thousand pictures already in my head.

Garden and Nature Notes

Autumn is always a good time to think about what worked and what didn't in the garden and plan to make changes for the next year. My garden looked a bit flat in late summer, things that I would have expected to flower in August and September were sometimes over much earlier and I want to think about what to use to fill those gaps next year - more Dahlias maybe, Helenium and Salvia. I am also determined to succeed with Cosmos next year after a couple of years when most of my seedlings haven't really got going, third time lucky perhaps. They make great, colourful fillers for gaps in the borders and are good for pollinators too. I have also noticed that Gaura just keeps going all summer and into autumn and want to use this pretty, soft perennial more.

Like many we are struggling to keep our Box plants healthy at Ashburnham Place, the historic fan beds outside the Orangery are suffering with blight again (presumably after the wetter conditions this year) and we are also battling box tree caterpillar which has decimated some of the large hedges around the West Garden and is evident everywhere else. We have used an organic control in the fan beds which seems to have held it at bay as well as being helped by the sparrows that are constantly in and out of the hedges helping themselves to food! We are looking at alternative plants in case we have to admit defeat - we want to try and keep the historic fan pattern if we can.

In the natural world, one of the highlights of the year so far was having a group of about a dozen White Storks roosting in the tree behind the house, they are spectacular birds up close and it was fascinating to find out (via their leg rings and www.whitestorkproject.org) that some of them were from Knepp, a mixture of released birds and those from wild nests there this year, one was originally from Poland. They were heading off for their migration to warmer climes but it was wonderful to host them overnight!

The results of the Big Butterfly Survey have just been released, with the lowest numbers recorded for 14 years which is really bad news but data that I'm sure most of us will agree, I saw far fewer this year than previous years. As well as planting flowers that are good for butterflies it's also important to research what plants the caterpillars rely on and make sure those feature in our gardens too. You can find lots of information on the website of Butterfly Conservation (www.butterfly-conservation.org). You can also download their app and take part in the survey next year. It's a great way to spend 15 minutes looking out for beautiful butterflies!
